2022 CAMPERSHIPS

"THAT'S OUR THING"



Giving campership assistance to Queens Scouts who need financial help is our main purpose. For this coming summer camp season, we will be awarding \$6,000 to Scouts from Queens to attend Ten Mile River this summer.

As of now, we have awarded 100% of our 2022 campership funding. Scouts are encouraged to request campership assistance from GNYC, if they did not receive funding from our association. We received many requests for assistance and tried to spread out our funds fairly to the districts and units.

For the first time since we began giving out campership assistance, we had our own Campership Applications to be completed by those requesting our assistance. This was to streamline the entire process for us to give out the funds. It was done this way, having our own application, rather than going with the Councils' own, because of difficulties GNYC has been having in sharing the required information with us. They were unwilling to give out the campership information and verify who received them as had been done for 35 summer seasons previously. Our applications have been on our web site and were also distributed to units by their district.

The fee for camping has gone up again for 2022 and with the economy still being on the Covid rollercoaster, we know that our camperships will once again make a big difference in many Scouts being able to go to camp.



A word from our President: **LOOKING BACK**

As we slowly approach our 36th year of providing campership assistance to the Scouts of Queens Council I wanted to recap on some of our accomplishments over the past 35 years.



Since our beginning we have now provided more than 1,465 camperships in the amount of more than \$106,400.00. This could not have been possible without your support and wanting to help make ***"Every Scout a Camper"***.

In the past 35 years we have also helped to improve both Camp Alpine and Ten Mile River Scout Camps.

At Camp Alpine we adopted the old B Shelter and it is now known as the Suanhacky Campership Association Cabin. Over the years we have donated in excess of \$6,000.00 to assist with the maintenance of the cabin along with the upgrading the lighting, remodeling the kitchen, replacing the front and back doors and the painting of the cabin.

We have also contributed to the Greater New York Councils Camping Committee funds to help with camp promotions materials.

All of this has been made possible by the generosity of our membership and has continued under sometimes very difficult times.

This year we are providing \$6,000.00 in campership assistance for our Queens Scouts so that a scout might attend a minimum of one week of summer camp and enjoy and experience and joys of the great outdoors. Camping is a main reason why a boy joins scouting and all of us are doing our best to give every scout the opportunity of being a camper.

As President of the Suanhacky Campership Association I want to thank all of you for your help and your continued support of the Suanhacky Campership Association.

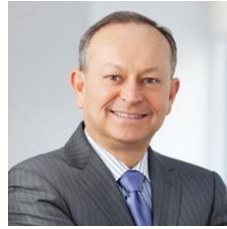

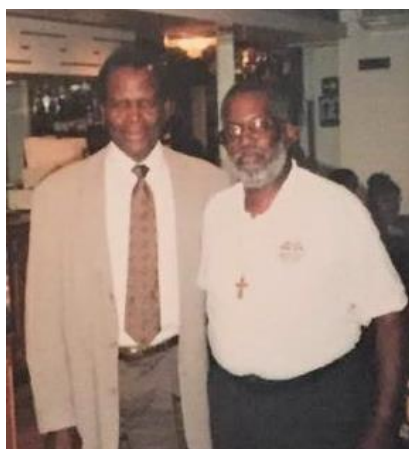

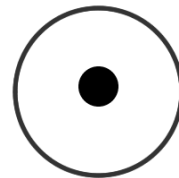

Her participation on the Catholic Committee on Scouting of the Diocese of Brooklyn was recognized with the St. George Award.

I loved the Blue dot trail around Crytal Lake, Eagle Rock for fishing, along with Trout Pond.

I remember one night our troop was camping off of the far end of Turnpike Lake in a lean-to site, when in the middle of the night, one of our boys woke up screaming. A monster was coming into his lean-to. As the brave leader, I sent Larry Offsey & Frank Janoscak who were the other leaders with me, to check it out. Sure enough, the kid wasn't lying, only it wasn't a monster, it was about half a dozen horses who had gotten out of the corral at the Ponderosa and stroll into our site. I must say it was a little scary, as well as hysterical.

These are just a small sample of my memories of TMR and the OA, along with lifelong friendships I made. It makes me sad that for all intense and purposes, the OA no longer exist in NYC as we knew it, within a few years most of TMR that we hiked and camped in, may still be there, but no longer completely Scout property.

So, hold onto to your memories my friends, perhaps share them with younger Scouts.

I feel sorry for today's Scouts who won't be able to build the memories of the OA & TMR that many of us have been able to. Then again, I may not be seeing the big picture, oh yeah, Picture Window may also be gone.
